

- Making observations
- Conducting fair tests
- Taking measurements
- Gathering data
- Presenting data

The class absolutely loved carrying out fair tests although they were surprised to find that it isn't always easy to make sure the test is completely fair.


"We had to be careful to not muddle up the measurements, and taking measurements can be tricky if you don't have the right equipment. Harry

One of the most amazing things we found out about was the Water Cycle. We now know that a dinosaur could have taken a bath in the same water that comes out of our tap today! We carried out some science investigations to observe evaporation and condensation then drew a diagram of how these processes fit in the water cycle.

Through our research, we found out that not everyone has access to clean water and water can also get easily polluted. As responsible citizens, we made pledges to conserve water or to keep it clean.

Should we have to pass on information about a bubble closing due to a positive case within a bubble, we will do so with the utmost urgency. So far, at the time of writing, we have not had a positive pupil case within school. We do have instances where pupils / families are self-isolating due to close contact with a positive case, but again, there are so far, no confirmed positive pupil cases within school.

Obviously we will not be able to divulge details as to which children are self-isolating or may test positive in the weeks to come due to GDPR and we would encourage you not to use social media to speculate as to who may be affected. If it is necessary for you to isolate, you will be informed to do so by us and the necessary test and trace systems in place.

If you have any questions at all, do please contact the admin team via email / phone as we are constantly being updated by the Local Authority and we will be able to answer your questions – if not immediately, by getting the answers for you from elsewhere.



Please could we ask all parents and carers to ensure that children come to school with all items required for the school day, including a warm coat for Autumnal weather. If you walk to School and the weather is very wet, we would suggest walking in wellies and bringing shoes for changing into once in school.

Instances of Parents returning to school after gates have closed with coats and lunches are on the rise. Whilst we would love to be able to go back to the normal way of life where parents and visitors are able to come into school, it's just not the way of the world currently. Therefore, if lunches are forgotten, we will provide lunches for your child (the cost will be added to your child's ParentPay account if your child is in KS2 and does not receive free school lunches). We will no longer be willing to receive forgotten items due to the increase in transmission rates locally. For this we apologise, but feel it is necessary to go the extra mile to protect not only our staff but our children too.
